A botanical lithograph: 'Pyrus Communis', the Common Pear. Distinctive teardrop-shaped fruits and foliage, with white blossoms indicating the tree's spring bloom. Golden tones of the pears contrast with deep green leaves; characteristic of scientific botanical illustrations of the late 19th century, circa 1890. [1. Binomial nomenclature, the formal system of naming species of living things, was developed by Carl Linnaeus in the mid-18th century. Each species is assigned a unique two-part name: the genus name, which is capitalized, and the species name, which is not. This system, introduced in Linnaeus' seminal work 'Species Plantarum' in 1753, brought a standardized and consistent method to the classification and naming of plants and animals, which is still the cornerstone of modern taxonomy. The nomenclature serves as a universal language among scientists and scholars, allowing for clear and precise communication regarding biological research. The enduring legacy of <u>Linnaean taxonomy</u> is evident in these exquisite botanical lithographs, where the artistry of the past converges with scientific discovery.
